Site Visits & Meetings

Buckeye Machine Fabricators

The Center and Buckeye Machine Fabricators began discussions in September to identify ways to build a pipeline of skilled talent. In early October, the Center gathered representatives from Owens Community College, Regional Growth Partnership, Raise the Bar Hancock County, and Midwest Regional Education Service Center to further discuss workforce resources available in the region.

A roundtable discussion was held at Buckeye Machine Fabricators headquarters in Forest, Ohio.

As a result, Mayle attended their BallisTech™ demonstration in Columbus. Through a collaboration with Dana Safety Supply, Custom Glass Solutions created BallisTech™, a bulletproof glass that enables officers to fire weapons through the same window that shields them. This innovation will significantly enhance the safety of law enforcement.

Introductory Remarks

The Center hosted our inaugural Advanced Manufacturing Summit on Thursday, October 10 at the Findlay Country Club. Center Executive Director, Tim Mayle (pictured right) kicked off the event with an overview of the Center, highlighting the structure, as well as current projects. Center Program Manager, Ford Weber shared an update of the Center's regional automotive research study, which focuses on inventorying, assessing, and making recommendations to automotive manufacturing facilities in Northwest Ohio. Weber emphasized the role of local economic development partners in this process. The study is expected to conclude by year-end, and results will be shared with stakeholders.



Keynote Speaker: Bryan Clem



Senior Manager of Risk Management at Toyota, Bryan Clem (pictured left), discussed five key factors driving businesses, including executive action, cybercrime, natural disasters, supply chain disruptions, and legislation. He emphasized Toyota's core principles of continuous improvement and respect for people, highlighting the vital role suppliers play in the company's success. Clem also outlined Toyota's approach to supply chain mapping, which helps manage risks like natural disasters, tariffs, and cyber threats. He encouraged companies to proactively address potential disruptions while maintaining strong relationships with employees and suppliers to foster resilience and growth.

Manufacturing Breakout Sessions

Following Bryan's keynote, the room was split in half, with facilitated breakout sessions on the "people" and "operations" side of manufacturing.

The "people" discussions, led by Regional Growth Partnership President/CEO, Dean Monske (pictured right) and Regional Talent Manager, Jeff Sprague, focused on the workforce challenges and opportunities within manufacturing. Key topics included the impact of COVID-19 on employee retention, remote work, and skill development. Participants discussed the need for succession planning, upskilling, and automation to fill gaps caused by an aging workforce. Additional challenges like work ethic shifts, leadership gaps, and recruiting younger talent were highlighted. Emphasis was placed on fostering relationships, continuous improvement, and engaging younger employees through internships and mentorships to ensure long-term retention.

The session on the "operations" side of manufacturing, led by CEO⁸ Consulting Owner, Chris Ostrander (pictured right), and President/Owner of Kata Solution LLC, Bryan Litte (pictured right) explored key topics such as supply chain management, energy usage, lean manufacturing, automation, and sustainability. The importance of digitization and artificial intelligence (AI) in optimizing operations, reducing costs, and enhancing productivity was emphasized. Participants also discussed inflation's impact on manufacturing and the necessity of continuous improvement. The conversation highlighted the need for companies to invest in both technology and people, balancing innovation with workforce engagement to maintain operational excellence and long-term sustainability.







Higher Education Panel

The higher education panel, led by Ohio Director of Development Lydia Mihalik, featured Bowling Green State University President Rodney Rogers, University of Findlay President Katherine Fell, and Owens Community College Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs Michael Pfahl.

The discussion highlighted the importance of collaboration between higher education institutions and industries in Ohio. Each institution shared how they align their programs, internships, and co-ops with industry needs, particularly in manufacturing and workforce development. Key topics included experiential learning, industry partnerships, and innovative approaches to addressing workforce gaps, with an emphasis on preparing students for in-demand sectors.





Networking

The event concluded with an opportunity for attendees to network and enjoy appetizers, providing an engaging atmosphere after a day of insightful discussions about the manufacturing industry.

Northwest Ohio Manufacturing Alliance (NOMA) Manufacturing Day


